


Doctors and What They Do






The doctor wears a white coat over her regular clothes. She takes her doctor's bag with her on house calls. A doctor who performs surgeries is covered from head to toe!

"I have an earache," sighs Liam.


"Liam also has a fever and a bad cough," says Daddy.






"Now I'm going to feel your belly," says the doctor. "How does that feel?

Good! All done."






"You must stay home from school for a few days, so that you can rest," says the doctor.

"So, my dear, what happened?" asks the doctor. Lola is crying. "I fell off my bike," she says. "My arm really hurts!"






The nurse takes a special photo of the inside of Lola's arm.

The doctor can see it on the computer. "I see. There's a crack in the bone," says the doctor.






Lola gets a cast on her arm.


"It can come off in a few weeks," says the doctor. Lola smiles.

When children go home happy, the doctor is happy too.







A doctor can be a family doctor, but can do other things too!
