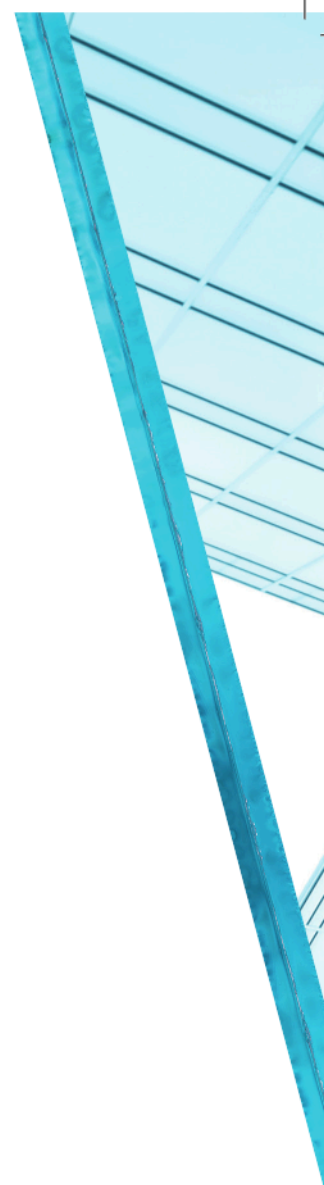

WHAT IS GLASS?
