Summer

Can you spot two young blackbirds squawking for food?
Young birds have left the nest.

Many visiting birds arrive.
They spend the long, warm days snapping up insects and seeds.

Caterpillars hatch from butterfly eggs.
Each makes a hard case, or chrysalis.
Inside, it turns into a butterfly.

Can you count 10 butterflies?

Wild flowers and tall grass grow where the sun reaches the ground.

Minibeasts live inside this tree trunk, and others creep underneath.

The young foxes love playing and exploring, and still live with their parents.



Autumn

Many birds fly away to warmer places.

Some will travel thousands of miles.
This is called migration.

The leaves turn red, orange and gold.

The young foxes are almost fully grown,
and can find their own food.

Squirrels gather nuts, and bury them to eat in the cold winter months.
How many squirrels can you spot?

Mushrooms and toadstools spring up among the damp, dead leaves. Can you spot six red toadstools with white spots?



Winter

The fox cubs are now fully grown.
They set off to find mates and
start their own families.

Can you count 12 birds with yellow chests?
They fly in from an even colder place,
to spend the winter here.

Evergreen trees
keep their green leaves
through the winter.

Deer nibble on tree shoots,
and paw at the snowy ground
to find grass.

Some plants bear berries in the winter.

Can you find red berries, white berries and black berries?
