In the week this is a platform for small creative businesses to sell their clothes, jewellery, ceramics and design products. Saturday is market day, and this is when street food stalls join in, including Bao Bar for Taiwanese steamed buns and Lemlem kitchen for modern African and Eritrean.

Housed in a vast former paper factory this covered market is home to an exciting array of street food and artisanal produce stalls, bars and cafes, with a focus on Italian culinary culture. MM is also home to the Backyard Cinema, a community garden and events such as terrarium and gnocchi workshops and vintage fairs.





The 5 best pubs for a **RIVERSIDE DRINK**

136 THE DOVE

This early 18th-century pub, cosy and low-ceilinged, is right on the Thames and accessed from a narrow path past Hammersmith Bridge. Close to the front door is a tiny room with seating for only dovehammersmith.co.uk a couple of people – this is claimed to be the smallest bar room in the world. There are excellent river views from the back of the pub.

137 TAMESIS DOCK

This brightly painted converted Dutch barge is a floating pub, moored on the Albert Embankment between Vauxhall and Lambeth Bridges. It enjoys wonderful river views across the Thames to the Houses of Parliament and Big Ben, best seen from the open-air top deck.

101 Bermondsey Wall East SE16 4NB Southbank ④ +44 (0)20 7394 3214 Dating from 1520 the Prospect claims to be London's oldest riverside pub. It has excellent views of the Thames and was a former haunt of smugglers, thieves and pirates as well as 'hanging' Judge Jeffries, who sentenced many to die at nearby Execution Dock. A noose hangs from a scaffold in the river to commemorate this history. Charles Dickens and Samuel Pepys are known to have drunk here.

Right on the Thames Path and next to Tate Modern this contemporary pub has a great position by the river, with impressive views from the large garden terrace and full-length pub windows across to St Paul's Cathedral and the City. Young's ales and gastro-pub dishes are served.

This Victorian pub in Rotherhithe has an outside balcony and views from both floors across the Thames to the skyscrapers of the City and upstream to Tower Bridge. Behind the pub are the ruined remains of King Edward III's Manor House, built around 1530. Walk along the Thames Path from Tower Bridge to get here: the views are excellent all the way.

Through a gap in the wall, between the books, you can access the Cake Shop, which is one of the best cafes in the city, a real literary salon.

The staff are incredibly knowledgeable and will go the extra mile to find the book you're after.

Chronologically organised, from the Victorian period to the present day, this nostalgic and engrossing treasure trove details the history of consumer culture.

Billing itself as a museum for the 'incurably curious' the Wellcome displays a highly unusual mixture of medical artefacts and original artworks that explore the connections between medicine, life and art. Based on the huge and varied collections of Sir Henry Wellcome, the permanent displays are fascinating and occasionally macabre. The innovative and exciting special exhibitions have included shows on the subjects of death, the brain, sex and dirt.

9-A St Thomas St SE1 9RY Southbank ④ +44 (0)20 7188 2679 oldoperating theatre.com Beneath The Last Tuesday Society's cocktail bar and literary salon lies Viktor Wynd's collection of curiosities, fine art and natural history: a fascinating, bizarre and often grotesque assortment of objects that evoke the pre-enlightenment origins of museums. Butterflies, two-headed kittens and lambs, taxidermy, tribal art and occultist pieces are all on display, and much more besides.

This very unusual museum houses the 47 foot long, 116 tonne Kirkaldy Testing Machine, able to exert a million pounds of pressure and to determine the tensile strength of any object. The museum is housed in 19th-century engineer David Kirkaldy's original testing works. Only open on the first Sunday of the month.

This unique museum houses the oldest surviving operating theatre in Britain, dating from 1822 – the age before anaesthetics and antiseptics. A collection of artefacts relating to the horror of medicine before the advance of science is on display. The site was also an herb apothecary where natural remedies, including opium, were grown for the hospital.

The 5 best NEIGHBOURHOODS to visit

371 STOKE NEWINGTON

Hackney (9)

'Stokey', as it is known to locals, has retained its London 'village' feel. Centred round the historic Church Street area there are plenty of independent and distinctive shops and restaurants. The area has a strong community character and there are plenty of green spaces to explore too.

372 GREENWICH

Greenwich has many famous historical attractions to offer, but there are plenty of other reasons to visit this lively community, including the excellent markets, the independent shops and restaurants, the Meantime Brewery, the O2 concert venue and the beautiful park.

373 SHOREDITCH East ③

Shoreditch earned its reputation for creative cool in the mid-to-late 1990s. It's still the centre for much of East London's entrepreneurial and cultural activity with many fashionable independent shops, bars, clubs, coffee shops, restaurants and start-up businesses.

HERNE HILL

An attractive historic town on the river Thames, 8 miles west of central London. There are riverside pubs and restaurants, a good range of high-street and independent shops, theatres, an indie cinema, boat trips and a wonderful urban Green. From Richmond Hill is a superb view along the river to Eel Pie Island, and beyond that lies marvellous Richmond Park.

Multicultural Brixton has a wealth of exciting attractions, chief among these being the must-visit Brixton Village and the excellent markets, music venues and cinema. Nearby Herne Hill has attractive Brockwell Park with its Lido and cafe, and interesting indie shops and a farmers' market near the station.

Housed in a former magistrates' court building, this hostel near King's Cross offers stylish and affordable accommodation for backpackers and budget travellers. There's a late night bar in the basement, a film lounge and many other facilities. The original heavy-doored prison cells that give Clink 78 its name are available to sleep in, as well as the dorms and private rooms.

Above The Hootananny pub in Brixton is a great value hostel. The lively 'dub pub' is an award-winning live music venue specialising in reggae, dub, international funk and soul styles, hip-hop and also comedy acts. The hostel facilities are basic, but in a good location, comfortable and very reasonably priced.



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
