The zen garden at the back was the first in Britain and the overlooking Glasgow cathedral the oldest building in Scotland.

13 PETERHEAD PRISON MUSEUM



The siege lasted for five days until home secretary Douglas Hurd called in the SAS (British Special Forces) to retake the prison. One of the guards held captive, Jackie Stuart, was a popular guide at the museum for many years. Although he passed away in 2023, his story is still told on the tour, which provides a thought-provoking insight into Scotland's only convict prison.



Govanhill Baths is the last remaining Edwardian public bathhouse in Glasgow. It was opened to the public in 1917, and apart from leisure, an important function of the building was to provide steam laundry facilities to local residents living in tenement buildings. Officially closed in 2001, the future for this excellent building looked bleak. However, an array of events ranging from art to poetry, and theatre has kept the spirit alive. Thanks to steady campaigning from community group Govanhill Baths Community Trust the building might be restored in the future. It remains closed for now, but their programme continues across Govanhill in other venues. Every workshop, gig, or screening you go to helps fund the future wellness centre. A great piece of Glasgow history still writing its next chapter.

The Isle of May is a wonderful nature reserve in the Firth of Forth that's ideal for spotting sea birds such as puffins and mammals such as Atlantic grey seals. The best way to get over there is to book a boat trip with Anstruther Pleasure Cruises. The trips last around 4,5 to 5 hours giving you at least 2,5 hours on the island to enjoy the walks and scenery. The island is owned and maintained by Scottish Natural Heritage. They have rangers stationed there to give you important information about the island and its biodiversity. May and June are the best times to see breeding seabirds, and best to book later on in the day to see puffins, as they are usually out fishing during the day.



120 COIRE FHIONN LOCHAN

Coire Fhionn is a beautiful wee mountain loch that sits about 350 metres above sea level. It's been carved out by glacial ice and now holds clear but peaty water fed by fresh hill streams. It even has its own little white granite beach, which is a great place to stop for a picnic, or to ditch your towel if you want to go for a dip. It's around a 5,6-kilometre walk, so it should take you a couple of hours to go there and back. The views over to the Mull of Kintyre on the way up are also beautiful. Park at Thundergay, which should get a laugh from the immature amongst us, and follow the signs.

Forget Ben Nevis, it's busy and full of tourists trying to tackle it in their flip-flops. Ben Lawers is where to go. Sitting at 1214 metres it is the 10th highest Munro in Scotland and it is a magnificent place to escape and take in nature, too. Red deer, ptarmigan and black grouse are just some of the wildlife you'll spot here. For those who don't want to walk to the top there are well-marked lower slope trails, but for those who want to take on the challenge and summit: please allow at least 6 hours to do so. Once you get to the top, breathtaking views await, especially over Loch Tay, Glencoe and over to the Cairngorms. It's really quite special. The National Trust frequently runs guided walks that are a great way to explore, especially for the less experienced. See their website for booking details. Please don't get caught out in the Scottish mountains, they are ruthless. So take walking essentials with you, even on a nice day. Park at the NNR car park and remember your £3 for parking.

Free thinking is encouraged and genres include feminism, anarchy, Marxism, civil rights and refugee stories. T-shirts, pins and patches are also available, if you want to wear your politics on your sleeve.

You can hike Britain's most northerly Munros, Ben Hope or Ben Klibreck, or take on the slightly smaller but just as beautiful Ben Loyal. There's also a lot of Highland history to explore right on its doorstep, including the Rosal Highland Clearance Village. Whatever you get up to, there's an excellent dinner service and bar to return to after you've relaxed in your Highland room.
