The chips here are perfect, fried in beef dripping and served with creamy aioli and smoky bravas sauce. There are plenty of fish and seafood options including scallops, squid, sardines, pickled anchovies and a smoked eel omelette, but if you want it deep fried it will have to be the devilled crab fritters.

St John's Lane EC₁M ₄BU Clerkenwell (2) museumstjohn.org.uk The London Wall was built by the Romans between AD 190 and 225. Evocative remains of the wall that once encircled the old City can be seen near the road that was later named after them.

street was where the devastating Great Fire Farriner's bakery. It quickly spread, raging for two days and gutting most of medieval off butcher's carts into the lane.

This impressive brick and stone gate was built in 1504 as the entrance to the Priory of the Knights of St John, one of few remnants of London's monastic past. In the early 18th century painter William Hogarth lived here. Today it houses the Museum of the Order of St John.

309 ELECTRIC AVENUE

SW9 8IP South (5) This street in Brixton was built in the 1880s and was among the first in Britain to be lit by electricity. Today it's partly the location of the Brixton food market. In 1983 it was the subject for an electroreggae hit by Eddy Grant.

310 BREWER STREET **CAR PARK**

Brewer St W₁F oLA Soho (1) brewerstreet carpark.com This wonderful art deco car park, built in 1929 and still in use today, is one of the earliest examples of a ramped multi-storey car park. During the 1950s and 60s it was apparently a location for shady payoffs to the police from the local red-light industry. More recently the car park has hosted the London Fashion Week, and has been used for art installations.

The 5 most revealing FREE VIEWPOINTS

356 PRIMROSE HILL

Primrose Hill Road NW3 3NA North ¹00 royalparks.org.uk/ visit/parks Primrose Hill is a grass parkland which lies just to the north of the much bigger Regent's Park. There's a wonderful view south across central London. It's adjacent to the attractive and prosperous neighbourhood of the same name, and to London Zoo. A stone at the summit quotes William Blake: "I have conversed with the spiritual sun. I saw him on Primrose Hill."

357 WATERLOO BRIDGE

WC2R 2PP Southbank (4) This elegant bridge affords the best and most dramatic ground-level view of London. To the west are the Houses of Parliament, Big Ben and Whitehall. To the east stand the towers of the Barbican and the City, and the dome of St Paul's. To the south the Royal Festival Hall, the National Theatre and London Eye. To the north Somerset House, the Savoy Hotel and the Shell Building. The restless, murky river surges beneath you.

358 RICHMOND PARK

TW10 5HX royalparks.org.uk/ visit/parks This wonderful 17th-century deer park is London's largest green space. From Sawyer's Hill there are great views to central London with the London Eye and Gherkin visible, and from King Henry's Mound near Pembroke Lodge is a famous protected view to St Paul's Cathedral. The vista was created in 1710 and is framed by a cut through trees in the park.

The view takes in Greenwich Park, the beautiful National Maritime Museum and Old Royal Navy College buildings, the Thames, Docklands, Canary Wharf's skyscrapers and the City.

Ragged Schools were charitable institutions providing free education to the poor during the Victorian era. This fascinating building was once such a school and recreates the Victorian educational experience, including a typical classroom and displays about East End childhood and local history.

The V&A's sister museum in Bethnal Green holds the largest collection of children's toys in the country. In each area there's an activity station to engage children, as well as a sandpit, board games to play and a book corner with storytelling.

The IWM has a large atrium full of guns and tanks with aircraft hanging from the ceiling, including a Spitfire and Harrier jet. Beyond this there are some thought-provoking and creative displays on both the front line and the home front during the World Wars. The Holocaust and Crimes Against Humanity displays are recommended for older children only.
