A word of caution: strange places often have strange opening hours. To avoid disappointment, be sure to check the opening times online before you set off.


BIZARRE BAROMETER ?????

THE MOST BELGIAN FRONT GARDEN IN BELGIUM

The Vlasschaardstraat in Ingelmunster might just be the liveliest dead-end street in our tiny country. As soon as you drive into it, you'll see the flags waving from the colourful front garden of number 12. It looks like a tricolour bomb exploded in this fever dream of a garden. Not a single blade of grass in sight – just a wild collection of curiosities in the three bold colours of the Belgian flag: black, yellow, and red.

Why settle for a grey letterbox when you can paint it in the national colours? A black-yellow-red hamburger? Sure. Giant *Manneken Pis* statues in patriotic hues? Why not. And don't call it a front garden – call it 'King Baudouin Park'. That's what the owner, Armand, prefers. He doesn't care that there's a well-known dolphinarium with the same name just half an hour away.

Armand is a patriotic eighty-something who has lived in this house for over forty years. He shares his home with his daughter Isabelle and his wife Marie-Thérèse. Back in 1984, things weren't going so well for Armand, until he stumbled on a state portrait of King Baudouin at a flea market. The photo made him feel so much better that he started seeing King Baudouin as his guardian angel. That one purchase sparked a collecting frenzy that has taken over his home and front garden for the past four decades. Armand began hoarding anything related to the Belgian royal family and, by extension, anything featuring the national colours. The rest of his collection fills his home. SEXY SATAN OF LIEGE

THE DEVIL WHO WAS TOO SEXY FOR THE CHURCH

For anyone looking for an exciting adventure in Liège, a visit to the city's last adult cinema is in order: Ciné Midi-Minuit. This small erotic temple with five rooms is equipped with dozens of glory holes and gets top reviews online such as 'It smells like sex and it's sticky everywhere.' But if you prefer a less sticky adventure that smells not of sex but of incense, then head to the other sex temple in the city: St. Paul's Cathedral. Yes, a 13th-century house of worship that you might assume to be completely sin-free with its stained-glass windows, dramatic paintings, and imposing organ. But, lo and behold, in the middle of this church stands a 19th-century sex scandal: a devilishly handsome statue we like to call the 'Sexy Satan of Liège'.

In 1837, the diocese of Liège decided the cathedral needed a bit of a facelift. They ordered a new pulpit and also wanted a statue of Lucifer, the fallen angel, aka THE DEVIL. The job was given to Joseph Geefs, a young guy from Antwerp who booked a male model and immediately put his chisel skills to work on a piece of marble. In 1842, his Ange Du Mal (Angel of Evil) was finished and placed in the church. Joseph's devil was easy on the eyes. Maybe too easy on the eyes: sitting on a rock, this beautiful, muscular guy wears little more than a loincloth and looks seductively at his own body, as if to say, 'Look how handsome I am.' The 'Angel of Evil' was portrayed as a sex god, which had churchgoers swooning en masse... at mass. Girls were fighting temptation during the Lord's Prayer, and even some men only had eyes for Sexy Satan. Of course, this became a problem for the church, so the statue had to go. This Satan was way too sexy for the church.

A new statue was commissioned, this time from Willem Geefs, Joseph's brother. And what do you do as a sculptor when you're asked to make a devil that's less sexy than your brother's? Exactly, you book the same handsome model and create an even hotter devil. Willem's devil, Le Genie Du Mal, is even more muscular and better looking than his predecessor. This is not Sexy Satan, but Super Sexy Satan. What was supposed to make him less attractive, according to Willem, were the claw-like toenails (to each their own), the chains around his ankles (definitely a market for that), and the hyperrealistic veins in his bat wings (we can give you a website). The church gave up and left the statue in place, where it remains today under the cathedral's pulpit. When we saw it, the sunlight was streaming through the stained-glass windows, shining right on his six-pack. Our only thought: 'Damn, that Satan's a master of seduction.'
