






## Bob van den Born 1927-2017

The apocalypse of professor Pi

## Phase 1: The sorcerer's apprentice

Pi is a professor but of what? Pi, to name but a few, is a doctor, a surgeon, a dentist, a musician, a mountain climber, a techie, an educator, a traveller; in short, a polymath. He is an expert in everything. A remarkable change occurred in professor Pi's illustrious life, in correlation with the shape of his nose. In the beginning professor Pi was a sorcerer's apprentice, experimenting with the ordinary world. He examined the laws of nature and manipulated them to suit his needs. He knotted the streams of water in the shower, fished the ripples out of a lake, pulled the sea by the tideline onto the beach, tamed a single wave, and made a cloud rain indoors. In the drawings Pi pushes the boundaries of the artist: he reaches the end of the vanishing point, picks the speed lines out of the air when he goes fast and moves a candle by nudging the shadow it casts.

## Phase 2: The world gone mad

The well-ordered cosmos is turned upside down by Pi's interventions: a monstrous universe no longer controlled by its creator. The elements break free, flora and fauna go off the rails, machines go haywire. Deviations suddenly become the norm. Masked dogs, a megaphone speaking in flowers, a cactus protecting itself with barbed wire, a skullphone, cherubs with the measles.

## The anomaly

The world's transformation is accompanied by a change of behavior in Pi. From a sorcerer's apprentice he mutates into an observer, flabbergasted by the metamorphoses he has brought about. Pi evolves from an unstable factor in a stagnant society to an anchor in the chaos. The change occurs in the 1000th comic story. It's striking that the more the environment comes apart at the seams, also stylistically, the blacker Pi's contours get.



The about-face in the interaction between Pi and the world may have a simple cause. Initially, the strip had a classic three-panel division. But when Van den Born discovered he could deliver the gag in just one picture, the landscape began to take over. The transition was complemented by a spectacular change in Pi's nose. In the first strips, Pi has a sharp, hooked nose, but the more unhinged the mundane world gets, while Pi changes from a 'nutty professor' into a bewildered spectator, the rounder and smaller his nose becomes (from strip #250).
